Please let me invite you to contribute to the preparation and later to favour a mindful lecture of this special issue of the Journal of Men's Health dedicated to forensic evidence supporting differences between male and female suicide.

According to the WHO, hundreds of thousands of people die from suicide every year, constituting a major cause of death especially in the adolescent-young adult population. There are several risk factors that have been associated with suicide, which vary according to the population in terms of sex or age. Furthermore, the methods in which suicide is attempted or committed are different, depending on the population identified. In fact, according to common sense, albeit supported by scientific-statistical backgrounds, there are cruel and bloody methods more typically carried out by men, compared to less painful methods selected mainly by the female sex.

Therefore, the purpose of this special issue is to identify specific forensic evidence that characterizes the differences between suicidal events between the male and female sex, in order to identify specific behavioral or injury patterns.
